The EXPLORE MICHIGAN trip is part of International & TCK Student Orientation, taking place Saturday to Monday.

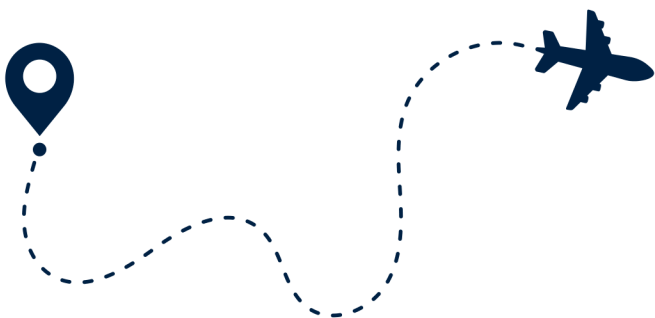

ACADEMICS

Note: Adapted from California State University, East Bay's International Student Handbook for F1 and J1 Students

You may find American teaching methods and practices quite different from those you are used to. Regular class attendance, frequent exams, homework, and participation in class discussions are all expected in the U.S. educational system. International students often find the classroom atmosphere and the student/professor relationship very casual and informal. Professors are required to keep regular office hours, which are intended specifically to provide student-professor contact.

School Year

The academic year consists of two semesters, each approximately 16 weeks long. The Academic Calendar can be found in each semester's Class Schedule at plus.hope.edu and the Registrar's Office website hope.edu/offices/registrar.

Students may also take classes during the summer session. Summer session is offered to allow students to take classes that are needed to complete your degree. Taking classes in the summer may help you graduate quicker. However summer classes are usually not covered by scholarships and may be an extra cost.

Academic Advising & Boerigter Center for Calling and Career

Academic advisors help students with understanding themselves and planning for the future. When you come to Hope as a first-year student, your advisor is your First Year Seminar (FYS) professor. You may declare a major any time after your first semester. Once you have declared a major, you'll be assigned an advisor within that academic department, but there are a couple offices (Registrar's Office and the Boerigter Center) that offer additional leadership and coordination with advising.

The Registrar's Office helps equip students and advisors to understand curricular requirements, registration, and the tools available to assist with that process. The Boerigter Center helps students with major and career discernment using tools including personality, strengths, and interest assessments.

Academic Structure

Students typically enroll in at least four 3-credit courses a semester in order to maintain full-time standing. Courses usually change every semester. Some courses are part of a sequence, requiring students to take the first course in the sequence before enrolling in the second course, and so on. Individual students are granted flexibility in choosing their coursework; students may choose from a variety of subjects and change from subject to subject as long as the college, the department, and graduation requirements are met.

Classroom Procedures

During the first week of classes, the instructor will hand out a syllabus, which will outline the course objectives, required textbooks, chapters to be covered, due dates for assignments, attendance policy, and the grading policy. Changes may be made to the syllabus during the semester, but only after the professor has informed the whole class about this decision. The syllabus will include the instructor's office location, office hours, mailbox, e-mail, and telephone numbers.

Diverse Teaching Styles

Professors may use lecture, class discussion, or both. Most classes meet on a regular schedule once, twice, or three times a week. The teaching style of the professor can determine the amount of student participation in each class. Some instructors prefer a more formal style of lecture with a possible question and answer period at the end. Others prefer a more conversational style and encourage interaction throughout the class. When expressing your views in class, be ready to explain your ideas, and do so in a respectful manner.

Attendance

Your course instructor will inform you of the attendance policy at the beginning of the course. Regular attendance is expected of all students unless suffering from illness or in case of an emergency. Some portion of the class grade may be based on attendance. Missing more than a set number of classes could result in a lowering of your final course grade. If you must miss a class, email your professor before the class meets to let them know of your absence.

Class Participation

Many professors encourage class participation and often expect it. In some courses it is a part of the overall grade. If you feel hindered to participate because of your English proficiency, we strongly advise you to discuss this issue with the professor and the International Student Advisor.

LIVING IN THE US & Cultural Adjustment

Language & Culture

Studying in the U.S. can be a wonderful learning experience. The U.S. mainly speaks English, but you may hear languages from all over the world. It is important to remember that:

1. U.S. society is made up of diverse groups and cultures that have helped shape its values;
2. Some individuals and groups have a set of respected values that are quite different from those of mainstream America;
3. People's attitudes and behavior are based on their values.

MAJOR AMERICAN VALUES

Individuality

U.S. Americans are encouraged at an early age to be independent and to develop their own goals in life.

Independence

The U.S. was founded by people who valued independence. Many believe that individuals reach maturity at age 18 and should be ready to make independent decisions.

Equality

The U.S. upholds the ideal that everyone "is equal" and has the same rights. This includes women and men of all cultural, ethnic, gender, and religious groups. However, many inequalities still exist. You may hear negative comments about other groups or even experience discrimination. If this happens to you and you wish to talk about it, speak to your International Student Advisor or a counselor.

Time

U.S. Americans take pride in making the best use of their time. In the business world, "time is money". Being "on time" for class or an appointment is important.

Informality

The U.S. lifestyle is generally casual. Friendships are also casual, as Americans seem to easily develop and end friendships. Greetings and farewells are usually short and friendly. In some instances, such as a job interview, formal attire and greetings are recommended.

Achievement and Hard Work

U.S. Americans are very achievement-oriented and always seem to be "on the go". You may hear the term "work hard, play hard." A competitive spirit is often the motivating factor to work harder.

Direct and Assertive

U.S. Americans try to work out their differences face-to-face. They are encouraged to speak up and give their opinions. In classroom lectures, it is acceptable for students to challenge or disagree with certain points.

Looking to the Future and to Change

Children are often asked what they want to be when they grow up; college students are asked what they will do after they graduate; and professors plan ahead for retirement. Change is often equated with progress.

Holidays

There are several major holidays in the U.S. Classes are canceled on some, but not all, holidays. Check the Academic Calendar on the Registrar's Office website.

Adjustment and Culture Shock

You may notice that these American values are, in some instances, quite different from your own. You may experience culture “shock” as you learn to adjust to the new culture and way of living. It includes the shock of a new environment, meeting new people, and learning the ways of a different country. It also includes being separated from the important people in your life, such as family, friends, colleagues, or teachers. This is very normal and requires both time and patience.

Culture shock is entirely normal, usually unavoidable, and it does not mean anything bad about you or your new home. Actually, it can be a very significant learning experience, because it makes you more aware of your own culture as well as the new culture you have entered. It will give you valuable skills that will serve you in many ways in the future—it’s part of the benefit of international education.

Some typical signs of culture shock are:

- Extreme homesickness
- Loneliness
- Avoiding contact with other people, especially Americans
- Negative feelings and hostility toward American culture and people
- Anger, frustration, confusion
- Tiredness or need for excessive amounts of sleep
- Boredom
- Inability to concentrate or work
- Loss of appetite
- Loss of enjoyment in daily activities
- Lack of confidence
- Feelings of inadequacy or insecurity
- Depression and feelings of helplessness



Managing Culture Shock

Here are some ideas to help you manage culture shock:

- Understand that your reactions are normal
- Be open-minded and curious about your new environment
- Talk with the International Student Advisor about your feelings
- Make friends with Americans and other international students
- If you struggle with academics, talk with your professors and the International Student Advisor
- Stay busy with academics, hobbies, friends, and other interesting activities
- Exercise or participate in sports
- Try a new activity that you can’t do in your home country
- Don’t forget the reasons you came to America
- Be patient with yourself and your new culture

If you experience culture shock, just remember that it is a normal part of being an international student. You will pass through periods of ups and downs, but in the end it will all be worth it. Try to focus on all the positive and rewarding aspects of your experience!

Remember If you are having a difficult time with your transition or adjustments to Hope College, please know there are many campus resources that can help. You can contact the Center for Global Engagement, your academic advisor, and Counseling and Psychological Services (CAPS).

HEALTH CENTER



The Hope College Health Center, which is located in the Dow Center, is your source on campus for medical-related services. Our providers include medical doctors, physician assistants and registered nurses. We treat most college health concerns. When specialty care is needed, you may be referred to a local provider. DRIVER'S LICENSE

A Michigan Driver's License or Identification Card is often required in order to cash checks, open a bank account or buy something with either a check or a credit card. Without one of these documents, you will need to carry your passport with you at all times, which is not recommended. You can easily obtain one of these documents at the Secretary of State Office. An appointment is recommended.

To obtain a Michigan's driver's license, you will need to consult the State of Michigan's Secretary of State's office. Information regarding the steps you need to complete can be found at: michigan.gov/sos

Contact the International Student Advisor for more information when you are ready to apply.

Conveniently, there is a Secretary of State office in Holland, located about a mile from campus.

The address is: 587 E 8th St., Holland, MI 49423.

Some points to note:

The Secretary of State office conducts the written portion of the driving test, but does not conduct the road test. To schedule a road test, you will need to contact a driving school like Century Driving School, which is the one closest to Hope College, and also conveniently located a few doors down from the Holland Secretary of State office.

If you think you will want to purchase a car later for internships or post graduation OPT, be aware that your car insurance rate will be lower the longer you have had your license, so you might want to consider getting your Michigan Driver's license as soon as possible.

SOCIAL SECURITY



All international students must obtain a Social Security number (SSN) before they are permitted to work on campus. You will need a job offer and other documents to apply for a Social Security number. Employment is limited to 20 hours per week while school is in session. Full-time employment is allowed during the annual vacation or when school is not in session.

TAXES

The U.S. tax system can be a bit confusing. All international students are required to file their tax returns by mid April of each year. International students pay state tax and, depending upon income, federal tax. The regulations for international students are different than those for U.S. citizens and Permanent Residents. The Center for Global Engagement will offer a tax-filing workshop early in the spring semester. Watch for email information from the International Student Advisor.

TRANSPORTATION



AIRPORT TRANSPORTATION

Hope's Transportation Services can provide students and groups with regularly scheduled and as-needed rides to and from Gerald R. Ford International Airport (GRR) in Grand Rapids. Transportation Services offers rides by request to/from the Gerald R. Ford International Airport when a ride is needed outside of the prescheduled shuttle block times. Requested airport rides are on a request basis only and will not be confirmed until a driver has been located. Requested Student Airport Shuttles are for students only and are \$35.00 per student, per way.

RIDES TO THE TRAIN/BUS STATION

Hope College offers rides to the train station in Holland at no cost to students. If you're looking to set up a ride, please call Transportation Services at 616.395.7075. Any requests outside of business hours will need to go directly through Campus Safety (616.395.7770). hope.edu/offices/campus-safety

Please contact Campus Safety at least 20–30 minutes before you need to be picked up to ensure that an officer will be available.

OFF-CAMPUS RIDES

Transportation Services offers off-campus rides in the Holland -Zeeland area for field placements, internships and appointments Monday–Friday, 8 a.m.–5 p.m. \$3 each way (\$6 round trip) All rides provided through Campus Safety are charged directly to a student's account; they do not accept cash, checks or any other form of payment. All charges through Hope College are added to a bill to be paid through Business Services. All rides will need to be requested at least 72 hours in advance and set up by emailing rides@hope.edu the following info: Student ID, phone number, ride location, times, dates, duration (e.g., all sem. until finals week).

ON-CAMPUS MEDICAL ESCORTS

The Transportation Department offers free medical escorts to students who are injured, recently had surgery or just need help getting around from your residence hall to classes, on-campus jobs, the cafeteria, etc. at no cost. Contact them in advance to set up a schedule.

GETTING AROUND HOLLAND BY BUS

The Macatawa Area Express (MAX) is a small urban transit system that operates fixed hourly bus routes bus routes and an evening Twilight Route Monday through Friday in the Holland/Zeeland Area. There is no service on the weekends nor on holidays. Fixed route buses depart from the Padnos Transportation Center located at the intersection of 8th Street and Lincoln Avenue at the top of the hour every hour and return to the transfer center at :50 to allow for passenger transfers. Wait for the bus directly at the bus stop sign or shelter so the bus will see you and stop. For more info please check out: catchamax.org.

NOTE: UBER is not generally available in the Holland area.



LAUNDRY

One of the "best" parts of adulthood....doing your own laundry!

Hope College provides self-serve laundry facilities in each of the residence halls, cottages and apartments. All laundry rooms are available 24/7. Almost all laundry machines on campus are operated through the use of PayRange. This free app communicates between smartphones, tablets or bluetooth-enabled laptops and PayRange-equipped washers and dryers. A limited number of coin operated washers and dryers will be available in each of the residence halls only. If you use PayRange, you will need to add funds to your account using a credit card. Wash: \$2/load. Dry: \$2/load.

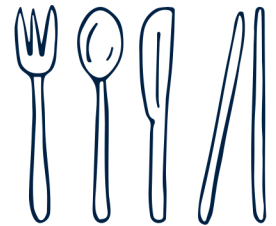

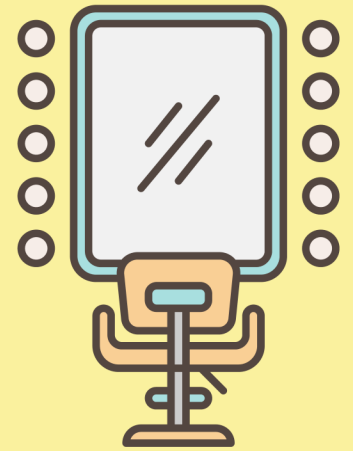
