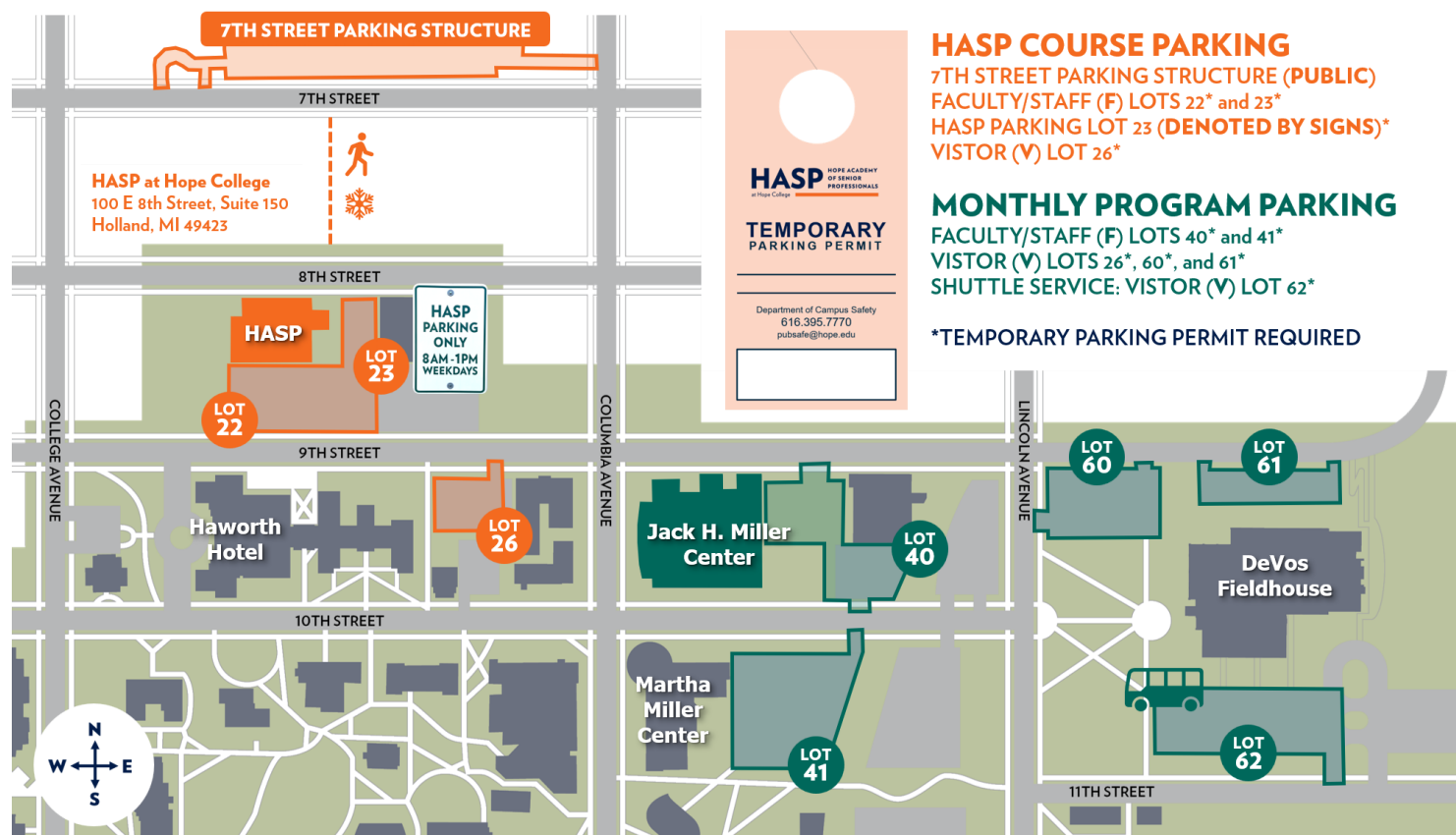

Founded in Holland in 1960, and the Chorale is now under the artistic direction of Dr. Patrick Coyle. The ensemble has performed at iconic venues across the globe, including Carnegie Hall, and has collaborated with regional symphony orchestras and other vocalists.

By the time this newsletter is published, the Fall 2022 semester will almost be over. Statistics collected by our director Ian MacNeil so far this semester show that members have registered for a whopping 3,800 course sessions. Attendance-wise, 3,000 members had shown up for classes through mid-November. This represents an average attendance rate of 77%, comparing nicely to our attendance rate for Summer 2022 which was 72%. Other statistics that Ian has been collecting show that almost 50% of Fall classes were presented by HASP members. Given that one of HASP's original goals was to have courses taught by members, this is a rather impressive number. As time passes and the data that Ian is capturing about courses accumulates, we will be able to report more interesting and useful statistics about HASP classes.

Planning is underway for the Winter/Spring semester which will run from January 23rd through the end of April, with registration beginning on January 11th. One thing to note about this semester is that we will not be having a second registration as we have in the past several years but registration will be open all semester long.

At this point, we have 49 classes planned with a total of 82 sessions. These numbers are a bit lower than Fall numbers (55 courses with 95 sessions), but hopefully this should make it easier to choose among the great courses we are offering without overloading yourselves. And I think you will find that we have some exciting and unique offerings for you this winter including "How to Listen to Great Music: The Orchestra", "The History, Culture, and Social Practices of Chinese Tea", "Bugs in Guts: Bacteria Inside Us" and "McCarthyism: Then and Now". I hope you will be as excited about these offerings as I am.

Due to the intensity of the Winter/Spring planning process, I am postponing more discussion on HASP participation. However, in looking further ahead, HASP member **Jack Hyde** is developing a class targeted for the Summer or Fall of 2023 for which he is asking for member input. This is another great way to participate. Here is Jack's request:

A HASP course on members' firsthand experiences with immigration is being planned.
