Program: **"It's Time We Draw the Line," presented by Voters Not Politicians Executive Director Katie Fahey**

Feeling divisiveness and polarization two days after the 2016 presidential election, Katie Fahey resolved to do something about it. She posted on her Facebook page, "I'd like to take on gerrymandering in Michigan. If you're interested in doing this as well, please let me know."

The concept of creating a system that would represent voters rather than politicians took on a life of its own. Dozens, hundreds, and then thousands joined Fahey and Voters Not Politicians (VNP), a nonpartisan organization was born. This grassroots organization of 5,000+ volunteers joined Fahey to take action to amend Michigan's constitution and create an Independent Citizens Redistricting Commission.

Under her leadership, Voters Not Politicians volunteers collected more than 425,000 signatures from all 83 counties within a period of 110 days. Way beyond the number of signatures needed to be approved by the State Board of Canvassers. The vote for a constitutional amendment to change how Michigan voting districts are determined will now be on the November 6th ballot.

Fahey's efforts have drawn attention around the country. Huffington Post, the New York Times, Rachel Maddow Show, CNN, The Boston Globe, The Miami Herald, U.S. News & World Report, and Michigan Public Radio are among the many news media outlets that have featured Katie Fahey and the Voters Not Politicians efforts.

Fahey graduated from Aquinas College with degrees in Sustainable Business and Community Leadership, and is working toward her MBA in Sustainable Business. Fahey's career began with SpartanNash, where she created their first sustainability program, and went on to work for the Michigan Recycling Coalition.

Katie Fahey will discuss how grassroots campaigns can succeed and the purpose behind Proposal 2.

November ~ Gerald Ford: From Youth to the Oval Office

Thursday, November 15, 2018

9:00am-4:15pm, \$25pp

As a legend of Grand Rapids, Gerald Ford has left his legacy for the world. Many stories of this "favorite son" will be shared with a morning visit to the Presidential Museum, followed by a two-hour afternoon bus tour through the places he knew during his All-American youth (1913-1931) in Old Grand Rapids. Under the leadership of Chief Tour Ambassador, Caroline Cook, you will experience an inspirational story of a young man who was raised in a great Midwestern city to become a world leader. You will learn where he lived, played, worshipped, studied, and competed athletically. As a final stop, we will view his tomb and statue.

During the morning visit, you will be on your own to explore among the many exhibits the remarkable replica of the Oval Office and "In Step with Betty Ford: In Celebration of Her Centennial." Graduate of Grand Rapids' Central High, student of dance, New York model, proud mother, and congressman's wife, First Lady Betty spoke openly about personal and political issues near and dear to her heart. Her courage endeared her to the American people as she found herself "in step" with the times.

In order to provide opportunity for you to personalize departure to accommodate your interest at the two locations, lunch will be on your own in the Café across the street at the VanAndel Public Museum. At noon, the bus will provide transportation for anyone still at the Ford Museum.

1. Professor Nancy Cook (Education) is interested in securing **interviewers for Senior Special Education Exit Interviews**. The interviews will be held on Wednesday, September 26, in Van Zoeren 247 and will be divided into two time slots: 11:00-1:00 and 1:30-2:45, with two volunteers for each time slot (total of **4 volunteers**). The interview questions will be provided.

2. Professor Sara Alsum-Wassenaar (Art) would like five HASP **volunteers who grew up and spent most of their lives living in Holland**. This is for a historical mapping project they will be doing in a Basic Design class. **You will meet with students in small groups of two or three** during class time to talk about what the landscape of Holland used to look like. The class meets from 8:30-10:20 on WF and she would like the volunteers for a week in October.

3. Professor Tom Bultman (Biology) is teaching a course called The Science & Culture of Coffee and is looking for a volunteer who has **past experience in the coffee industry**. Have you been involved with purchasing coffee, run a coffee shop, roasted coffee, or had some other experience with coffee (besides drinking it)? The class meets on Tuesday and Thursday from 9:00-10:50.

4. Professor Lauren Hearit (Communications) is teaching a capstone course in strategic communication and public relations campaigns. If you have had **experience in marketing, advertising, or PR**, she would love to have you come in and present for about 20 minutes about your experience. The class meets on Wednesday nights and she would be happy to work around your schedule.

5. Mary Ellen Kettelhut (Entrepreneurship Program) will have 18 students who have taken her class or have started a business of their own. They would like to have **mentors** for these students. **Optimally, a mentor would have started several businesses and would bring general business knowledge and life balance choices to their budding entrepreneurs and their teams**. Some of the projects that they are working on include: Parking detection system, Prosthetic arm innovation, Coffee roaster and shop, Farmers market delivery service, FitMe - on line clothing service, Photo editing via machine learning, On line amazon sales platform for household items. There will be a mentor/HEI student match making event Monday, September 17 from 5 pm to 7 pm in VanZoeren, Conference room #1, **light dinner included**. Involvement after that will likely be 1-2 hours per week meeting and /or in digital communication with a team.

6. Professor Christiana Salah (English) will be teaching a Cultural Heritage (IDS) course about the social experience of having a disability. **Course topics will include: accessibility, changing cultural and religious views of disability, legal movements for disability rights, stigma and prejudice, mental health, and disability**

in art and literature. She would like her students to hear perspectives on these issues from members of the disability community directly. Do you have relevant experience in this area that you would be interested in sharing, perhaps in the form of a panel with Q&A, or as a guest speaker? This experience might be personal, professional, or both. The class meets MWF 11:00-11:50.

7. Professors Carrie Bredow, Katelyn Poelker, and Daniel Zomerlei (Psychology) would like HASP volunteers for their **Developmental Psychology** classes. Those who have participated in the past have spoken highly of their experience. You will meet with 3 or 4 groups of 5 or 6 students and **share your insights as you reflect on your adult years** and respond to questions from the students. Katelyn Poelker's classes meet on Friday, November 30, 9:30-10:20 and 1:00-1:50. Carrie Bredow's class meets on Wednesday, December 5, 11:00-11:50, and Daniel Zomerlei's classes meet on Tuesday, December 4, 8:00-9:20 and 9:30-10:50. They would like 5-6 HASP volunteers for each of these sections, a **total of 25-30 volunteers.**

8. Professor Richard Ray (Kinesiology) is teaching a First Year Seminar (**FYS**) that helps new students as they begin their journey at a liberal arts college. What he has in mind involves having pairs of students with similar interests and likely vocational paths connect with a HASPer whose professional experience matches the professional interest of the students. The **students would** - at a minimum - **interview the HASPer and prepare a report based on some criteria that he will establish.** At the least the relationship might entail one or two meetings. In an ideal world he hopes that some authentic relationship might develop - something akin to friendship. We need a list of possible volunteers so Maura can serve as a matchmaker once he learns enough from the students to put them in pairs. He doesn't anticipate more than 9 pairs. He won't know the students' interests until the first week of the semester.

9. Professor Steven Hoogerwerf (Religion) is supervising an independent study in the area of **medical ethics.** As her final project, his student Karissa Libson will be working with him to develop a workshop on the topic of **how to deal with difficult patients or the difficult families of patients.** Medical care workers have often identified this as a challenge and are always seeking ways to deal kindly with people who are "difficult." Karissa would like to meet with one or more HASP members who have **had careers in health care** and could either tell a story about a difficult patient or family and/or provide insights from their careers about how they found ways to treat people who were difficult to deal with. She'd be happy **to set up one or more individual appointments or to meet with a small group of HASP members in a single setting.**
