Program: **“Our Environmental History- Do We Understand the Risk: subtitle “A Discussion of Environmental Risks from Historic Industrial Use”, presented by Mark Worrall, a hydrogeologist/geologist working with the Michigan Department of Environment**

How do we know where sites of environmental concern are? Can resources spent on environmental risk be prioritized better with a historical perspective? This presentation will examine how environmental sites are documented in Michigan and made known to regulators. The discussion will then explore if the use of historical resources can move regulating agencies from reacting to environmental sites of concern to anticipating these sites and the benefits that would come from this shift of perspective.

Mark Worrall has been in the environmental industry for over 20 years as a hydrogeologist/geologist in both geologic-environmental consulting and as a regulator for the State of Michigan. He has been with the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes and Energy - Remediation & Redevelopment for eleven years and is currently the Grand Rapids District Geologist. For the last two years he has worked solely on the Wolverine World Wide/North Kent PFAS project. When not working as a geologist Mark researches, lectures and writes about Michigan’s railroad, mining and industrial history. His family consists of his wife Tina, daughters Abby and Ellie as well as their crazy dog Pumpkin.

UPDATE FROM FACILITIES PLANNING COMMITTEE:

Kim Mendels, Barbara Stegink, Dave Vanderwel, Kara Slater, Scott Travis

At the annual meeting in June, Kim presented the background information and future plans for renovation of space on the first floor of Anderson-Werkman for a new HASP home. The next week, our committee held three meetings with HASP members, one in the classroom, one at Warm Friend and one at Freedom Village. The purpose of these meetings was to listen to members' comments, concerns and questions as we move into the renovation process. Thank you to all who attended these meetings which helped us prioritize needs for our growing organization.

Since those meetings, the committee has met several times to outline our needs and preferences for the space; to review plans of architectural concepts; make revisions of the same; and finally reach a consensus of an acceptable floor plan. From data collected over the last two years, we learned that 68% of all course sessions have 50 or less registrants; 95% of all course sessions have 100 registrants or less, with only 5% then requiring a classroom capacity of over 100 registrants. Our main concerns and focus have been on classroom size and capacity. Although the new classroom will be similar in size to the present classroom on the 2nd floor (100 theater style), it will be a space that can be divided into two smaller classrooms and provide flexibility for different classroom setups. The placement of and proximity to screens for viewing presentations or films will also be closer to the seating areas. Together with the present classroom on the second floor and the new classroom(s), we will be able to schedule all classes except for those with over 100 registrations. Those will continue to be scheduled in a large venue on campus when available.

The new facility will also include a larger welcome area than we have now. There will be a reception desk, library area with comfortable chairs, and a kitchenette conveniently placed between the doors to the classroom(s). Offices and workplaces for staff will be located off the welcome area. Our classrooms and other spaces in the building will be available for scheduled committee or small group meetings.

To date, plans for the renovated facility are “on target” and we look forward to sharing future decisions and plans with you as we move into the next phase of the project.

2019 Annual Business Meeting Minutes

June 4, 2019

Haworth Inn and Conference Center

President Lynn called the meeting to order. He called attention to the copies of the 2018 meeting minutes, there was a motion to accept, it was supported and the motion was carried.

President Lynn asked the membership to join in a time of silence as we remembered the HASP members who have died this past year. We fondly remember their contributions to the Academy and their friendship. President Lynn read each of their names as Kim Mendels lit a candle for each deceased member:

The candles remained lit for the duration of the business meeting.

The Treasurer's financial report, along with a written annual report, was provided in the June 2019 monthly newsletter and one copy was provided on each table. Kim Mendels provided additional comments on the budget report and restricted fund update. To date income is \$153,184.00, just over \$25,000 more than projected due to high enrollment in courses and more new member dues than anticipated. To date expenses are \$91,499.00, with a forecast of \$118,825 for year-end once May and June bills are paid. Director Mendels thanked the membership for their healthy participation in courses, and Treasurer Don Cowie, along with audit committee, Dave Vanderwel and Maura Reynolds, for their careful attention to and stewardship of HASP resources. A final year-end report will be published in the fall newsletter. The Board of Directors approved a \$134,000.00 budget for the 2019-20 fiscal year. The membership was reminded that under our alignment with the Hope College Alumni and Engagement department HASP funds are now kept in a restricted account under Hope College. This means all HASP funds – income and expenses, flow through this account only. If there are any excess funds at year end, the HASP Board of Directors decides what to do with it.

Current values of the HASP Endowment fund (\$579,454.00) and two HASP scholarship funds (\$57,648 and \$55,643) were also shared. She asked if there were any questions regarding the financial reports and there were none. The report will be filed for audit.

President Lynn then referenced the six standing committee reports which were published in the June 2019 newsletter and asked the membership if they had any questions for committee chairs and there were none.

Director Kim Mendels presented her Director's report with a PowerPoint summary.

Director Mendels provided an overview of the HASP fiscal year highlighting the points below:

- Membership: To date HASP has 862 members compared to 771 this time last year. There were 158 new and/or reinstated members and three new member orientations.
- Curriculum: HASP offered 120 courses (up from 106 the previous year), 256 sessions over three semesters.
 - Curriculum introduced a new initiative to help/encourage members to lead courses by offering two info sessions for members to learn more about how to do that.
 - Eight Friday Noon Series were provided
 - There are currently three SIG's (small interest groups) meeting.
- Monthly Program: 11 informative monthly programs – and in various locations!
- Special Events: 13 special events
- Communications: 28th edition of the HASP Review – 40 writers, 9 illustrators – THANK YOU for sharing your stories and creative work!
- Service: 112 volunteers in Hope College classes, over 100 HASP volunteers involved in other projects: Tulip Time guides, GR Symphony ushers, Baggie Books, AP proctors, Holland Museum, etc.
- New website – always check the events and calendar page and blog posts for recent updates!

She thanked all the committee chairs and committee members and volunteers for their faithful work that makes all of the above possible.

Additional updates included the following:

- Two significant Board of Directors actions:
 - 1) Voted to hold six meetings at the Holland Civic Center and five at the Jack Miller with the annual meeting to be determined. Membership feedback included 331 responses, 47% to 42% (Jack Miller versus Civic), 10% no preference.
 - 2) Approved use of a portion of the HASP Endowment/Facilities Fund (up to \$450,000) to renovate space on the first floor of Anderson Werkman for new office, welcome/hospitality space, and an additional classroom.

Director Mendels then shared membership growth data from 1988 to present, highlighted feedback from the last two membership surveys (2014 and 2017) that helped inform the decision to move and the concepts for the renovation project for both first floor and second floor use of space. Facility improvement finances and planning committee information was shared along with a facility improvement timeline for the next year. The board appointed a special committee to gather input, make decisions, manage the budget and work with an architect. The committee includes the HASP Director, two HASP members (Barbara Stegink and Dave Vanderwel), and two college administrators (Scott Travis and Kara Slater). We will be offering three information/feedback sessions for HASP members on this project in June.

Director Mendels concluded her report by reminding members of a quote/call to action from our founder Dr. John Hollenbach:

“Preserving the sense of responsibility by every member is one of the constant challenges of HASP as an organization. Members must understand that to join is a contract to be a doer, a planner, a volunteer in service, on occasion a leader or facilitator rather than simply a recipient”...

HASP is unique in that we were designed to be a PEER-LED program for learning in retirement with an emphasis on service to Hope College and to our community. She asked members, “How are YOU fulfilling your sense of responsibility to HASP?”

President Lynn called retiring board members forward for thanks and recognition.

President Lynn thanked them for their faithful service to the Academy and Board. Kim Mendels presented them with a parting gift. President Lynn read all the names of HASP members who were retiring from the six standing committees, asked them to stand, and thanked them for their service.

Director Kim Mendels gave the 2019 Nominating Committee Report. She thanked Loren Meengs, Andree Keneau, Gary Scholten, Judie Zylman and Diana Nelson for their work on this committee.
